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The Education Commission was set up last September to help the world develop a plan for achieving the ambitious Sustainable Development Goal on Education (SDG 4) which calls on the world to “ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all.” This is an enormous challenge. More than 124 million children and youth do not have access to primary and secondary schools. And of the roughly 590 million that are in school, some 250 million—roughly two in five—are failing to learn the basics of reading, writing, and math.

The Commission hopes to change this. A group of world leaders have come together to make major recommendations about how every child and young person can reach his or her potential through education. These leaders will put forward an agenda for action and **WITH YOUR HELP**, inspire and persuade leaders to act.

Judging

The top three videos will be selected by the Education Commission’s Youth Panel, co-chaired by **Kennedy Odede** (Kenya) and **Rosemarie Ramitt** (Guyana) and including **Malala Yousafzai** (Pakistan). A People’s Choice Award will also be given to the video that receives the most public votes. The Education Youth Video Challenge is being organized in collaboration with A World at School Global Youth Ambassadors and MTV Voices.

Prizes

Winning videos will be screened at the Education Commission's meeting in July in Oslo, on various MTV and partner platforms, and at the Commission's report launch this September in New York.
